Born and raised in Whyalla, I've been a local resident all of my life other than a period of 7 years, and I've been back in the country town of Whyalla for close to a decade now. The town is dear to me, based upon the opportunities and lifestyle provided, and because of the people and memories made here. Growing up, I wasn't entirely cognisant of Whyalla's reliance upon industry to support the population and local communities. It has become increasingly clear to me (upon my return to Whyalla) that Mining has played a pivotal role in supporting the local steel manufacturing industry base, to provide some industrial diversity in the immediate region. Now, the local Mining Operations are no longer viewed as a support service to the Steel industry – the Mining assets now contribute to significant (relative) export activities in their own right, and provide substantial employment opportunities while still maintaining support of the local Steel Manufacturing plant.

Beyond supporting the sustainability of the township (on a macro scale), I have friends that own or work for small businesses that support and are supported by the primary employers of the region. Small companies that support families by employing locally and also supporting the local region by way of sponsorship and/or generous donations. None of which would be possible without the mining industry as a significant contributor to the local community.

The mining framework has evolved significantly over the years, and the ethics, developmental model and supportive structure of some of the primary mining service providers / employers (that I have personally worked with) have enabled many local residents to become leaders for their families and the local community. An increasing focus on safety, health and wellbeing allows these leaders to transmit these learned values and skill sets in the community space, once again providing benefit to the culture and wellbeing of the township.
